About Medical Mission Aid

Medical Mission Aid (MMA) is a Christian charity whose vision is to see a sustainable improvement in health outcomes in the most vulnerable communities globally.

MMA was initially established as an auxiliary of CMS Victoria on the 5th January 1920 and has been serving the poor for over 100 years. In the early days, MMA sent medical supplies and equipment, medication and a variety of donated goods via parcels and later in shipping containers, to countries where CMS missionaries were based. MMA was transformed in 2002 from being an auxiliary of CMS to become an organisation (charity) in its own right. MMA now offers support to medical and health related activities in developing countries, partnering with church and other local organisations.

One of our key strategic objectives is to enable local community-led transformation in healthcare in remote and vulnerable communities. We do this by increasing the quality and quantity of trained local medical staff in developing countries through medical, nursing and allied health scholarships for disadvantaged students. We also assist in the procurement of equipment and medication to enable local Christian healthcare providers to improve medical care for the impoverished. Additionally, MMA equips local Christians and leaders to implement preventative health initiatives, thereby reducing the overall burden of disease.

Another key strategic objective is to facilitate access to healthcare for all, irrespective of gender, caste, class, race, religion or political persuasion. We target those in remote communities where access to healthcare is particularly difficult and where extreme poverty is prevalent, with a focus on marginalised populations, including women, children, refugees and people with disabilities.

MMA is incredibly grateful to all supporters and partners who have helped to improve the lives of many people over the last 102 years.





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



Medical, Nursing and Allied Health Scholarships

Christian Health Initiatives (CHI), South Sudan

Prolonged civil war has decimated South Sudan's health system and health indicators confirm this, with very high maternal and under five mortality rates and low life expectancy. CHI is training students in Clinical Medicine and Midwifery in order to build the capacity of the National healthcare system. It is expected that this will address the fundamental problem of the shortage of healthcare workers at most of the rural and semi-urban healthcare facilities, and ensure access to and availability of basic healthcare services and preventive care for most of the population.



Introducing Ayen Nai Mayen by Anil Ch

Jonglei State and Upper Nile are two states which were most affected by the 50-year civil war in Sudan. Jonglei State is one of the largest states in the Republic of South Sudan. Even though the people of this state played a vital role in securing the freedom of the southerners (now South Sudan), the state is largely under developed and behind the other states in most of the developmental parameters. Recent research shows that only around 5% of girls complete their primary education and only 2.5% complete secondary school.

Ayen Nai completed her primary education in Malek near Bor. She was one of the five female candidates selected to study Clinical Medicine at the Bor Institute of Health Sciences in Bor Town. Nai proved be an intelligent student and was consistently at the top of her class from the very beginning. She proved to the people around that women from rural South Sudan are equally capable and can become skilled and competent healthcare providers. While this is true in every part of the world, it is remarkable in a conservative, male dominated society.

Ayen Nai not only performed well academically but was always available to help the other students, especially the other girls. Some of these girls struggled in the first year. But seeing that Ayen Nai was able to perform well convinced them that they could also be equal. As a result, three of the five female students finally emerged among the academically top students.

Ayen Nai topped the National Health Professionals Board Examination and earned an average score of 84% and passed with distinction in all subjects. She also got the highest marks among 300 or more students in Medicine, Surgery and Obstetrics and Gynecology.

The success of Ayen Nai clearly shows us that in the last four years, the Jonglei Health Sciences Institute has emerged as one of the best performing health sciences institutes in South Sudan. However, our hope is that with her intelligence and strong work ethic, she will be able to inspire a young generation of Dinka girls to take up sciences in school and become skilled and competent health workers.



Medical, Nursing and Allied Health Scholarships

Murgwanza Hospital

Murgwanza hospital is in a very remote community in Tanzania, with the nearest specialist hospital 400 kms away. In order to save lives, Murgwanza Hospital's strategic plan included the training of 6 specialists in the coming years.

MMA has been supporting 3 doctors for the last 3 years, and they will complete their studies this September. Dr Christian will be qualified as a General Surgeon, Dr Deonatis in Internal medicine and Dr Frank as an ENT. All of these doctors have worked extremely hard and this is a wonderful achievement. They will go back to Murgwanza Hospital to provide specialist services that have been unavailable to this remote population. Congratulations to these doctors they will make a huge difference to the people of this region and surrounding communities.

Berega hospital is situated in a poor rural area in the Kilosa District of Morogoro Region in Tanzania. This scholarship program hopes to assist young women and men from poor families to train as medical professionals to lift the students and their families out of poverty and to help build capacity at the hospital.

This year MMA awarded scholarships to seven students studying clinical medicine and nursing.

The Berega Institute of Health Sciences has recently received accreditation for a pharmacy and social work course, and MMA look forward to supporting students in these areas in the future.



I would like to convey my sincere gratitude for the support made by MMA towards my nursing course. I started this course in 2019 when I was very naive in the field. The support made by MMA through Berega Hospital at Berega Institute of Health Sciences instilled knowledge in me such that now I can provide care to patients like conducting deliveries, drug administration, monitor vital signs, counselling patients infected by HIV/AIDS, vaccinate clients who need of vaccination for Corona. Also I am able to provide services to the elderly and children as well. On completion of my studies in early September in this year I expect to work at Berega Hospital.

Medical Mission Aid has been involved in the training of students from poor economic backgrounds in the fields of Nursing, Pharmacy, Dentistry, General Medicine and Hospital Administration.

Human Development and Community Services (HDCS)

"Our hospitals are located in the rural part of Nepal. Many health professionals don't want to go to the rural area of Nepal to provide health services. In this scenario, when we provide scholarships to our staff or their children and talented students from poor families, then they are motivated to serve through our rural hospitals. > Unfortunately, she has had little opportunity for formal training and therefore, MMA is supporting Poonam as she studies a three-year accredited diploma course counselling run by the Counselling Training Centre Kathmandu. Poonam will make a significant difference in the lives of those with challenging physical and mental needs, and stigma due to conditions such as spinal cord injury, leprosy, and end-stage disease.

Jitambue Project

Excerpt from report by Thomas,
Project Co-ordinator



"Providing youth with a life skills education is essential, and they should be exposed to this education at an early age. Due to cultural and nature of education in Tanzania, access to information with regard to reproductive health by the youth and vulnerable groups in the Tanzania particularly in Ngara District has been a serious issue. Most information on sexual and reproductive health and rights is not talked either by parents, guardian and teachers. In a generation driven by lack of access to information, the exclusion of vulnerable people from vital information means that they are further pushed frustration, poverty, early pregnancies, destitution and contraction of HIV and STIs. So young people need to acquire life skills that will help them to cope with the challenges they face.

These life skills include learning about proper hygiene, reproductive health, pregnancy, sexual abuse, male and female relationship, making right decisions, communication skills and many more. The Diocese of Kagera through Jitambue Project aims to bridge this gap in education, by structuring activities that will expose young people and students to these essential lessons and skills."

Care of Orphans

Hope Movement Missions (HMM) was founded by Pastor Fredrick over 25 years ago to care for the many orphans and widows around the Bungoma area in Kenya. There are currently 220 orphans in home-based care. However, many did not have basic necessities, such as mattresses and blankets, and this was resulting in regular illness, including pneumonia.

Last year, MMA provided treated mosquito nets to reduce the incidence of malaria, as

well as provision of funding for a borehole, resulting in the community having clean drinking water for the first time. This year, MMA has provided blankets and mattresses for 100 orphans. As a result, prevalence of disease has significantly dropped by as much as 60% and there has been an improvement in emotional and psychological health, as well as school performance.





Women's Health

MMA is partnering with Episcocare in a Women's Health program to improve the health and wellbeing of refugees from Syria and Sudan, as well as women and children from 6 slum communities in Egypt. This program is focusing on education around reproductive health and raising healthy children. The awareness sessions are also addressing sexual harassment and domestic violence and its effects, especially on young children, with ideas on prevention and response. Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) is also being discussed to increase the understanding of the complications of this practice and its serious psychological and physical effects on girls.



When S and her daughters travelled to Upper Egypt to visit her relatives there, her husband's family tried to circumcise her daughters. However, S refused and managed in persuade her husband to protect his daughters. According to S, "my husband agreed with me and refuse our daughters circumcision."



Care of people with disability

Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital



MMA sent funds for a new Operating Room light for the Obstetric Delivery Room last financial year. It finally arrived this year- no more baby deliveries in the dark or by torchlight!



MMA continues to support Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital, one of the world's busiest Leprosy hospitals. Together with funds to further train their exceptional staff, MMA contributed towards new wheelchairs, newborn weighing scales, a neonatal phototherapy light, baby cots, a humidicrib and a foetal heart monitor.

DHERSEC

Disabled and Helpless Rehabilitation Service Centre (DHERSEC) is a non-profit organisation in Nepal, established in June 2006 with a vision to support people with disability (PWD) as well as those living in extreme poverty. There is no medicare in Nepal, nor NDIS/disability allowances, so extremely underprivileged people are not able to receive medical care as even the public health system is not free. This is Prince's story...

Prince comes from a very poor family and lives in a squatters area in the Terai region of Nepal. His family are of the scheduled (or 'untouchable') caste, who experience inequality and discrimination at every level of their daily lives, limiting their employment and educational opportunities.


month Prince Six old was born Myelomeningocele - the most severe type of spina bifida. He had a fluid-filled sac protruding from his back that contained part of his spinal cord and nerves. Spina bifida can cause symptoms such as muscle weakness, loss of bladder or bowel control, and/or paralysis. Prince also had Hydrocephalus extra fluid in and around the brain, causing increased pressure on the brain. If this pressure wasn't relieved, it may have interfered with normal brain growth and development and possibly have led to permanent damage in the brain.

People from Prince's community approached DHERSEC, asking for help. With DHERSEC's support, life saving surgery to close the spinal defect and drain excess fluid from his brain was successfully completed.



MMA FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Barry Kelly

We are extremely grateful that our members and donors have continued to support MMA through the last financial year.

MMA is pleased to support worthwhile projects in Africa and Asia.

All donations received were spent on these projects, with the shortfall and other operating costs being covered by income received from other sources (government grants and investment returns) and by dipping into MMA's reserves.

2022 FY Income and Expenditure

Total **revenue** was recorded at \$626 thousand (k) for the 2022 Financial Year (FY) which was substantially up on the prior year due to a generous bequest from Betty Huston.

- Donations, which were up by 13% on the previous year, represented 72% of MMA's on-going revenue.
- The returns from MMA's investment portfolio represented 12% of our on-going revenue, down on last year reflecting the 2022 investment market.
- The Victorian Government's COVID Boost for small business support represented 11%.
- Other income, which mainly reflects the sum of incoming and outgoing payments associated with a legacy Op Shop matter, represented 6%.

Total expenditure for the 2022 FY was \$226k, 7% lower than the previous year.

- Project funds distributed to partners amounted to \$142k
- Employment, operating & administrative costs totalled \$78k, a similar cost to 2021 FY.

As a result, MMA reported a 2022 FY surplus of \$400k compared to a deficit of \$41k in 2021 FY.




